Judith Vogelsang is a filmmaker with over 20 years experience in film and television production, working in both fiction and non-fiction. She produced and directed the indie feature film, HEART-LESS, a psychological thriller starring Madchen Amick and Louise Fletcher (USA Network).

GOINGGREEN – Every Home an Eco-Home, is a half-hour, family program that mixes humor with everyday examples of ways to make your home more environmentally friendly. Judith received a 2007 DGA nomination for outstanding direction in a children's program for GOINGGREEN.

Judith's prior directing credits include primetime, network, dramatic, episodic television series and non-fiction specials for CBS, ABC, PBS, USA, Court TV and syndication. Judith worked as a staff director and producer of documentary, children's, news and fiction programming for CBS and PBS affiliates in the midwest and on the east coast. She won a CINE Golden Eagle Award for the hour documentary, BUCKS COUNTY, USA.

Judith formed Stone Harbor Films, Inc., to develop and produce quality fiction and non-fiction projects for features, television and new media. Judith was an Emmy judge and continues as a judge for the annual DGA Student Film Awards. In 2005 she served as a panelist on the Mississippi Arts Commission's annual literary arts awards.

Judith is a member of the Directors Guild of America, Academy of Television Arts & Sciences, International Documentary Association and Cinewomen.

She lives in Los Angeles with her husband, poet Arthur Vogelsang.
